



EATING THE CORRECT FOODS

March is a refreshing month. Flowers are beginning to bloom: leaves have started to sprout on the branches and birds are returning back. Each month the National Health organization selects a National Health Observance to look at so we can improve our health. Nutrition is one of March observances. How are you doing in your nutrition? Are you eating healthy?

To eat healthier, start by making small changes. Make each snack or meal contain nutrient dense food and try to avoid processed foods. Our food is what fuels our bodies and delivers the calories your body needs to function. If your diet is deficient in calories or nutrients your health could suffer. If you eat too much you may experience weight gain. The quality of your diet affects your health risks, longevity, and mental health. Diets rich in processed foods are linked to higher mortality and a greater risk of conditions like cancer and heart disease. Highly processed foods increase the risk of depressive symptoms.

Nutrients include: protein, carbs, fat, vitamins, and minerals and are what your body needs to thrive. All food contains calories, but not all food is nutrient dense. Foods marked as diet friendly, or low calorie may be low in calories, but they lack nutrients. Some nutrient dense foods are egg whites, salmon, sardines, kale, seaweed, garlic, shellfish, potatoes, liver, berries, eggs, melon (bitter) cocoa and dark chocolate. Nutrient-dense foods are rich in nutrients relative to their calorie count. These include whole vegetables, fruits, cocoa, seafood, eggs, and liver. Try adding these foods to make you healthier. Eat a wide variety of fresh foods. Stay away from eating so much processed food. Healthy eating habits are important, including fueling your body, giving your body the proper nutrients, lowering your disease risk, promoting optimal mental and physical well-being. Healthy Eating to you all.




The Gift of Empathy



March's book: *Mediocre*

by Ijeoma Oluo (synod recommendation)



What happens to a country that tells generation after generation of white men that they deserve power? What happens when success is defined by status over women and people of color, instead of by actual accomplishments?

Through the last 150 years of American history -- from the post-reconstruction South and the mythic stories of cowboys in the West, to the present-day controversy over NFL protests and the backlash against the rise of women in politics -- Ijeoma Oluo exposes the devastating consequences of white male supremacy on women, people of color, and white men themselves. *Mediocre* investigates the real costs of this phenomenon in order to imagine a new white male identity, one free from racism and sexism.

As provocative as it is essential, this book will upend everything you thought you knew about American identity and offers a bold new vision of American greatness.

From the Pastor's Desk

From the Pastor: **Wandering Heart, a Lenten practice**

I've said it before, Lent is my favorite season. Don't get me wrong, the other seasons are something special too. But it seems to me that during the Lenten season we are just so much more intentional about our faith and life. There is an intentionality of focus on what is most important, God's great love for us in Jesus Christ, and the sacrifice that was made for our salvation. The disciplines of Lent allow us an "excuse to be better." We often add worship, devotional time, prayer, fasting, and/or acts of service ... an excuse to be better about our faith practices.



With that in mind, each year, additional Lenten devotional practices are encouraged ... to make it easier, there's resources provided. This year, the devotional book is entitled "Wandering Heart," by *A Sanctified Art*. The resource has a little something for everyone: art, commentary, prayers, reflection questions, and poems. It includes wonderful poems.

I'd like to share one of the poems ...

Here's My Heart

*As a child I made a nativity set for my mother—
pinch pot clay, uneven angel wings,
hair made with the help of a garlic press,

(I believe that it was.)


*Maybe that's the way it is with God.

Bath towels vary in size. The 52" X 27" size is the maximum size.

20" x 40" is a good guideline for a minimum size.

Please give new items only.

Palm Sunday: March 24

We remember that the crowds cheered Jesus as he entered Jerusalem and the palms were laid before the donkey that Jesus rode. We begin differently, waving palms.

Maundy Thursday: March 28

("Maundy" is an English form of the Latin word for "commandment mandate," the new commandment to "love one another as I have loved you.")

6:30pm Simple Communion Service: On this evening, in the upper room Jesus and his followers shared bread and wine as part of their meal, and Jesus said, "Do this in remembrance of me." He also taught them to serve others through the example of washing their feet. Our service ends with the stripping of the altar as we anticipate the arrest of Jesus.

Good Friday: March 29

6:30pm Worship Service: On this day Jesus was tried and the people called for him to be crucified. We recall Jesus' time under arrest, his death on the cross, and his hasty burial in a stranger's tomb. Worship calls us to remember Jesus' self-giving sacrifice, suffering, and death.
